

Utah Q&A

1. Can people with a past felony conviction register and vote?

The right to vote is lost while convicted of a felony or misdemeanor until the right to vote has been restored. For those convicted of a misdemeanor, the right to vote is restored when sentenced to probation or incarceration term is completed. For those convicted of a felony, the right to vote is restored when sentenced to probation, granted parole, or incarceration term is completed.

2. Can victims of domestic violence, assault or stalking keep their address private if they register to vote?

Utah does not have a formal program for victims of domestic violence to keep their address private.

3. How do people experiencing homelessness register and vote?

A mailing or physical address is required to register to vote, but a homeless voter can register in Utah using a shelter address or a physical address where they can be found.
